Reflection Questions:

- What is one of the best communities you've ever been part of? What made it special?
- What stood out to you from Sunday's service? How did you sense God at work in you through the songs, the message, and being together with others as part of the church? (The message main points and scripture are listed below if it helps you think back.)
- Read Matthew 10:24. Take a moment to brainstorm some observations about Jesus' example of community from this description and from what else you know about his life. What do you notice about his example?
- Michael shared, "It is impossible to be selfless in isolation." He quoted Tim Keller, who said, "You cannot know God apart from community." How do you react to these statements?
- Read John 13:33-35. If you're able, read it from several different translations. What stands out to you?
- How does Jesus' command in John 13 challenge you today?
- Michael also shared that we often mistake connectivity for community. Have you experienced this? How?
- In the sermon, he offered two obstacles to community:
 - Fear of better options being afraid of commitment
 - Idealism and expectations

- Which of those is the biggest obstacle for you in experiencing community right now?
- How do you need to step deeper into community today? Get practical! Write some next steps down and share them with someone.
